Most courses had presentations as examination, I had to write a few reports as well but only 1 was alone and only 2 written exams

g. What is the culture of the university?

The teachers were really open to talk to you and learn about our knowledge and culture etc. the students were also really nice but unfortunately we did not have any lessons with French students. The other incomings were super nice and was really fun with them in class.

There was no cafeteria but almost everyday there was club sandwich, were students make different kinds of grilled cheese for super cheap. There were a lot of 'clubs' for everything, sports, art, wine, meat etc.

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? They help you so well!! I got a room at a student building where I had 9 m^2 with my own bathroom and a shared kitchen. I only paid 250 a month (even less because I got CAF (French thing where students get help paying rent)).

The vegetarian options are not as good as in the Netherlands. But the people are super nice and really want to help. It is a big difference with the north of France!!

As a student u can get a 'pastel card' which costs 9 euros to get and then u can get for 13 euros a month a unlimited public transport thing (bus/tram/metro). But otherwise you pay 1.80 for 1.5 hours of travelling so it is super cheap. The public transport works really well, in the beginning they scared us with strikes but that happened maybe twice that it really bothered me.
