I did this at Kin Culture where they among other things provide foster families for children in need.
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What is it like to study there?

E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material. Overall, really good experience. Kind people that work at the University and many of them want to help you during times you need it. Everybody speaks very well English. Academic level was not too difficult, but I felt like the examination (of for example essays) was often quite strict. After my final examination period I found out that two courses managed to lose an exam of mine, which was quite stressful. But I did not hear of this problem from other people, so maybe I just had bad luck.

What is the culture of the university?

E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?

Like I said, very nice and kind people! Not much engagement with local students from the university, but you can stimulate this yourself. Some of the classes that I took had more than 1000 students, which was something that I was not used to from the WUR.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities? Amazing gym and food options!!

5. Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? Multiple options, both from the university as private housing. Both are fine, but from my own experience I would recommend looking for private housing. I lived in a private house with 15 other exchange students. We did a lot together which makes living in a new place a bit easier!

What is the culture of the country like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?

Stellenbosch is quite westernized and 'white'. South Africa is a melting-pot of different cultures and nationalities. The country has 11 official languages! The South African people were coming of as very kind to me.

Even though I came quite prepared to Stellenbosch knowing that nowadays there is still discrimination and huge poverty, I did not expect to see the aftermath of the apartheid-

era so extremely. The huge inequality and gap between poor and rich in the country is very visible. Being there as a white exchange student often felt a bit wrong to me, but I also think that it is very important to experience this yourself. The university provided multiple volunteering incentives in which you can connect with the communities around Stellenbosch. The locals were very interested in the internationals and loved to learn about our countries. I think Stellenbosch/Cape Town have nice atmospheres. Just be careful with your belongings and use the provided safety principles.

Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure?

E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?)

Use uber (very safe!), rent your own car at Hertz (only €300 for a month, cheap when you divide it with others) or walk. Do not use the public transport.

6. Expenses

Ticket there: quite expensive (be prepared for around €1000 in total)

Housing costs per month & type of housing/accommodation: around \in 500- \in 600 per month.

Groceries: bit cheaper as in the Netherlands.

Restaurant/going out for dinner: very cheap and super good! Eating out is maybe even cheaper than buying groceries.

Daytrips/sight-seeing: differs a bit per activity, but overall same as in the Netherlands.

What are must-sees in the area?

E.g. nearby destinations, how do you prefer to travel, when to plan?

- Lots of beautiful wine estates around Stellenbosch, such as Delaire Graffe, Waterford, Hidden Valley, Ernie elst, Mont Marie for breakfast, Lanzerac and manyyy more.
- Cape town: waterfront, bo-kaap, food-markets (old biscuit mill and oranjezicht market).
- Hermanus whale-watching June-November
- Langebaan, flowering in August-September
- Garden route!
- All the amazing and cheap restaurants in and around Stellenbosch/Cape town.
- Travel with your own rental car for longer destinations or use an uber.

What does not appear in a travel guide, but is definitely worth a visit?

You have a lot of nice hiking trails in Stellenbosch, I used the app All Trails and really liked the hike to the waterfall in Banghoek Conservancy. Jonkershoek is also a beautiful nature park nearby.

Do you have general tips and tricks about leisure time?

E.g. recommendations for restaurants, going out?

I think pretty much all the restaurants are super good. But some of my favourites in Stellenbosch: Sofia, Manoushe, Warenmarkt, fat butcher, Lanzerac, Bootlegger, Wine Glass, Basic Bistro.

8. Challenges & best moment abroad

I enjoyed my weeks in Stellenbosch a lot!! Too much to see and do. Some of my favourite moments:

Watching whales in Hermanus in the sun on a cliff with two friends and some beers! Doing the garden route.

Seeing wildlife during random moments, like encountering a cape cobra on a hike! And seeing all the wildlife in Kruger and Addo Elephant Park.

Meeting local people and gaining new insights. Tasting South African food.

What challenges did you encounter and how did you overcome them?

Liked stated before, I found seeing the aftermaths of apartheid quite challenging. But for me it really helped to talk with other people about it, especially the locals, and to learn more about the history of the country. Me and some friends would also often buy homeless people groceries, but I understand that this does not solve anything in long term. Just try to help where you can and be thoughtful of the people around you and your privileged position in such a country.

What is your best memory of your time abroad?

Honestly the whole 5 months!! Enjoyed every aspect. After studying at the university in Stellenbosch I went on a 3-week trip to Namibia and Botswana with 9 other friends/housemates. Truly an unforgettable experience!
