2. Motivation for exchange

Why did you choose to go on study exchange?

I thought that studying and living in another environment in another place in the world is a very unique experience. Where you have the opportunity to see a lot at the place where you are going. Meet a lot of new people and friends in very unexpected places and also have the possibility to develop yourself as a person

What is the reason you chose for this country/university?

South Africa has always been on the top of my bucket list to see and go to, the country is beautiful with a unique combination of climate and nature. The main academic language is also English, so all courses are taught in a language that I could already speak. Stellenbosch as a city is known for its village feeling with a roaring student life, when the students are gone the city is a lot more quiet. But, they had courses that I really looked forward to and the location is very good, close to Cape Town and surrounded by mountains.

3. Accessibility to reach destination

Do you have any tips to reach your exchange destination?

The whole process did go quite okay for me, there was sufficient communication from the university regarding the arriving procedure. A few small tips:

- Apply for your visa very much in time, so start with the process as soon as possible
- Look good into where you are going to live, university has accommodations but private options are sometimes better. Keep the location most in mind.

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What is it like to study there?

The university has a different study form, there are a lot more things officially mandatory to be present in the classes. They also work with a lot more continuous assessment, sometimes even weekly tests. The academic level and workload is around the same as Wageningen. The examination form is thus more continuous, I also had a few courses that had a different type of questions during the examinations, more direct learning questions. Lesson material is a lot online and with slides.

What is the culture of the university?

E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?

Most lecturers are very approachable and are open to questions and a conversation when then talking to the lecturers. The local students are very open and will make contact with you very quickly.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

There is a student mall with food facilities as well as catering in the residences. The university has a sports ground and sports clubs of a lot of sports, of which a lot you can join for the one semester.

5. Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? There is university accommodation that you can apply for, private rooms, appartments and rooms in student houses are also available. Contact quickly when knowing you are going to Stellenbosch, because there can be a shortage in the private accommodations. Rent rates differ a lot per location and type of accommodation, but often between 300-500 euros a month.

Tips:

- Email accommodations directly, even if online states that it is full or application closed. They often have a few rooms left for exchange students
- Location is key, South Africa is not as safe as the Netherlands and some areas are better to live than others.

What is the culture of the country like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?

The South African culture is very open and inviting. The greeting way, even when meeting people for the first time is giving a hug. The local cuisine is often meat based, most famous the braai. There are also a lot of sweet regional things to eat.

Public transport does not exist currently, uber is the main way of transport on larger distances or in the dark. Short distance and to the university by foot most of the times.

Cycling is also an option. Uber prices within Stellenbosch, thus short trips, about 2-4 euro. Longer trips for example to the nature parks or Cape Town between 10 and 20 euros.

Renting a car is also a very viable option, which is guite affordable.
